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Vocational Education and Training Delivered to School Students (VDSS) allows secondary students to gain practical skills in a specific industry while contributing toward the completion of the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) or Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC).

FEATURES OF VDSS

- VET enables students to gain qualifications for all types of employment, and specific skills to help them in the workplace.
- Undertaking VET while at school allows students to mix general and vocational education and to make a start on training for a career before they leave school.
- VET programs are typically completed over two years and provide students with a qualification or partial completion of a nationally recognised certificate.
- Students can also study VET through School-Based Apprenticeships or Traineeships (SBATs).

BENEFITS OF VDSS

- VET programs contribute directly to the VCE, VCE VM and VPC and can contribute towards the ATAR score.
- Students gain industry experience and employability skills.
- Creates a pathway to further study.
- Provides opportunities to develop effective relationships with industry employers.

- Enhances knowledge of employer and workplace expectations.
- Develops the capacity for teamwork and leadership.

CREDIT TOWARDS THE VCE, VCE VM AND VPC

VCE VET programs are made up of VET qualifications approved by the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority (VCAA) to contribute towards the VCE, VCE VM or VPC. All VCE VET programs contribute to VCE Units that provide credit towards the VCE and VCE VM in the same way as a VCE study. Most VCE VET programs can provide credit for VCE Units 1-4. A small number of shorter qualifications can provide credit for VCE Units 1&2 only. Each completed 90-hour block of VET equals one VPC credit.

If you choose to do a VET qualification that is not from a VCE VET program, you may be eligible for credit towards your VCE, VCE VM or VPC. This is called block credit recognition. To receive block credit recognition, the qualification must be at Certificate II level or above for the VCE and VCE VM, or Certificate level I and above for the VPC.

STUDY SCORES AND ATARS (VCE)

Some VCE VET programs are scored and some are non-scored. VCE VET programs with a Unit 3–4 sequence can be included in the calculation of your Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

Scored VCE VET programs give you a study score for the Unit 3–4 sequence that is achieved through school assessed coursework and an externally set examination. Scored VCE VET programs provide a study score that contributes directly to your ATAR, either as one of your primary four studies or as a fifth or sixth study increment.

Non-scored VCE VET programs do not give you a study score but they can still contribute to your VCE. When you receive a Unit 3–4 sequence towards your VCE from a non-scored VCE VET program, they may contribute towards the calculation of your ATAR by the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC). Check with the VET coordinator at your school.

STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) is designed to help students apply the skills and knowledge they learn in their VET program in an industry environment.

STUDENTS WITH DIVERSE NEEDS

- The NMVC is committed to embedding inclusive education in all school environments for students with disability and diverse needs.
- Students requiring additional support to achieve successful outcomes in their VET program need to indicate this on their VET enrolment form.
- Arrangements will be made between the Home and Host schools to determine the support needs of students and provide access to educational and support services as necessary, so that students can meet the requirements of the VET course they are enrolled in.

UNIQUE STUDENT IDENTIFIER (USI)

A USI is required to enrol in a VET program. A USI is your individual education number for life. It also gives you an online record of your vocational education and training undertaken in Australia. To apply for a USI, please visit: *usi.gov.au*

CREDIT TRANSFER

If you have previously completed vocational education and training, you may be eligible for credit transfer for some Units of Competency (UoCs). This means you will not have to be reassessed for those UoCs. To check what UoCs you have completed you can download a statement of attainment from the USI website. You will need to provide this statement of attainment to your Host school following their credit transfer application process.

HOW TO ENROL IN A NMVC COURSE

Speak to your VET coordinator to discuss which VET course is right for you. They will advise you how to apply for your chosen VET course.

HOME AND HOST SCHOOLS

Home school – is the school you attend for your Year 10, VCE, VCE VM or VPC. Host school – is the school you attend for your VET course.

NMVC STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

Students enrolling in a VET program through the NMVC are required to adhere to the below expectations. Any additional course requirements set out by Host schools must also be followed.

ATTENDANCE

A minimum of 80% attendance is recommended. This gives students the best opportunity to learn and demonstrate competency that is aligned to the UoCs and associated assessment requirements. A minimum of 80% attendance does not guarantee a student will be able to demonstrate competency and be awarded a full certificate.

Whenever possible, students need to notify their Home school VET coordinator at least half an hour before the start of their VET class if unable to attend.

TRAVEL

Students are to behave in an appropriate and safe manner when traveling to and from their VET class.

PUNCTUALITY

All students are expected to arrive on time and prepared for class.

UNIFORM

Students are required to attend class dressed appropriately for their VET program. This may include a uniform and personal protective equipment (e.g., steel capped boots, safety glasses).

WORK REQUIREMENTS

All tasks as assigned by the VET teacher/trainer are to be completed to demonstrate competency. Students will be given multiple opportunities to demonstrate competency.

If a student is unable to demonstrate competency for a UoC they will be awarded a partial completion and receive a statement of attainment. Also, if a student is unable to demonstrate competency for a UoC that is a prerequisite for another UoC, they will not be able to enrol/complete this UoC. The Home school VET coordinator will be informed if a student is not meeting the work requirements of their VET course.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR

All students must meet the classroom expectations of the VET teacher/trainer and the behavioural expectations of the Host school. This includes meeting Work Health and Safety requirements and adhering to the mobile phone and laptop policy of the Host school.

STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING

SWL is a key feature of VET. SWL is compulsory for some VET courses and highly recommended for others. For courses requiring mandatory SWL it is the responsibility of the student and their Home school to organise a suitable work placement and communicate this with the Host school.

Failure to meet the above expectations will jeopardise a student's VET enrolment. It is important that students and parents/carers talk with their VET coordinator if there are any concerns.

DISCLAIMER

All course details and delivery arrangements contained in this handbook are correct at the time of printing (June 2024). VET programs are subject to change as there are continual changes to training packages and qualifications.

Any changes to the delivery arrangements published in this handbook will be communicated to students and parents/carers via their VET coordinator.

This course provides an introduction to a wide range of vocations in the sustainability, horticulture and community services sectors. It provides foundational knowledge in sustainability and environmental issues. Students use that knowledge base to build hands-on practical skills which they can use to address environmental problems across a wide range of workplaces. This is a two-year course.



My journey in trades was sparked by a childhood fascination with trains. Drawn to the idea of working for Metro trains and contributing to infrastructure projects, I embarked on my VET journey. 



My name is Nicky and I graduated from Peter Lalor Secondary College in 2023 with a Year 12 VCE VM completion.

The VET course that I chose was the Certificate II in Kitchen Operations (now called Cookery) as I had a love of cooking. This then turned into a passion, when you see how happy the dishes you have created make other people feel it is truly rewarding. The best part of my VET course was the support and encouragement that the teachers at Peter Lalor Secondary College gave me to continue with the course and to also catch up on some of the units that I had missed in the first year. At times some of the cooking, especially the baking, was challenging, but my teacher took a lot of time with me, always encouraging me and showing me the correct way to complete the tasks and I was always able to complete the tasks within the required delivery timeframes.

I learnt so much from my VET teacher over the two years of the course, apart from

the actual cooking I learnt knife skills, time management, multitasking, problem solving and numeracy tasks such as measurement, division and multiplication for increasing and decreasing recipes.

After completing my Year 12 and my VET Kitchen Operations course I was fortunate enough to be supported through the National Indigenous Culinary Institute to gain a first year apprenticeship with the Australian Venue Co. This career would not have been possible without my VET certificate or the support from the wonderful staff at Peter Lalor Secondary College.

I think that everyone should know that VET is an amazing opportunity to gain some background in a career that you think you might like to do while you are still at school. If you stick with it and gain your certificate nothing will stop you getting to where you want to be. 



I'm Willeford, a Year 12 VCE VM student enrolled in my second year of Certificate III in Music (Composition and Creation) at Sydney Road Community School.

I was taking another music class back when I first enrolled, but it was more to do with playing instruments, and I was much more interested in making music digitally on my laptop – and that's when my teacher recommended this course to me. The best thing about the course is being able to connect with others – it's nice to clock in, spend a couple of hours making tunes with some great people and then going home. It feels like everyone in the course has a common understanding about music and making art.

Although I don't have future aspirations to be in the music industry, I still want to keep making music as a hobby, and the skills I've learnt in this course will definitely help towards me doing that.

During this course I've learnt how to use Ableton, something I never really considered doing before coming here since I'm still a resident FL Studio user at heart. Constructing a song in every class is doable but it takes a lot of concentration – you really need to be in the right headspace for it.

I can always vouch for the teachers at Sydney Road Community School, and I definitely recommend this course to anyone who digs electronic music or sampling – it's made a big impact on my social life and it's just a really nice, welcoming environment.


